SRNS Employees Take Time Off to Team Up, Helping Those in Need Throughout Aiken County

AIKEN, S.C. – March 28, 2011 – Dozens of Savannah River Nuclear Solutions, LLC (SRNS) employees recently volunteered to complete nearly 20 charitable projects to improve the lives of potentially thousands of citizens living throughout Aiken County during this year's Project VISION "Day of Caring."

Each year a large number of SRNS employees commit to work, during their day off, to take on a project that will improve the living conditions of disadvantaged children, low-income senior citizens, the disabled or single parent homeowners. In several instances, a team of volunteers is assigned a project involving a United Way agency.

Projects typically cover a wide variety of tasks to include: clearing yard debris, painting, repairing flooring, replacing roofs, building shelving and wheel chair ramps.

"This recent effort continues a long tradition of SRS employees organizing into teams one day annually to offer a full day of community service," said Freddie Hartzog, SRNS Project Lead for the Helping Hands, Inc. project. "We had 50 SRNS employees working on just about anything you can think of ... building shelves for storage, repairing holes in walls, yard work, painting nursery beds, doors and wall trim work. It was a full day's work."

Project VISION is a function of the United Way of Aiken County.
